## Early life

- He was born before the Wolrd War I.
- From 1908-1916 he attended primary school in his home town
- After the school he joined at Budapest Technical University and he became an engineering student
- In 1919 decided to leave Hungary, because he didn't learn at university about the Jewish law.(numerus clausus)

## Early life

•In Berlin, Szilárd continued engineering studies at Technische Hochschule(Technical University in Berlin), and he soon changed to physics there and took physics classes from Einstein, Planck, and Max von Laue In 1922 he dissertation


on thermodynamics.

# His jobs, developing and nuclear chain reaction

- In 1938 Szilárd accepted an offer to conduct research at Columbia University in Manhattan, and moved to New York, and was soon joined by Fermi
- After learning about nuclear fission in 1939, they concluded that uranium would be the element capable of sustaining a chain reaction. Szilárd and Fermi conducted a simple experiment at Columbia and discovered significant neutron multiplication in uranium, proving that the chain reaction was possible and opening the way to nuclear weapons.

Szilárd later described the event: "We turned the switch, saw the flashes, watched for ten minutes, then switched everything off and went home. That night I knew the world was headed for sorrow".

## Nuclear Weapons

- In 1932, Szilárd had read about the fictional "atomic bombs" described in novel.
- This inspired him to be the first scientist to creation of nuclear weapons
- He was the first person to conceive of a device that, using a nuclear chain reaction as fuel, could be used as a bomb.

### After the war

•Szilárd married Gertrud Weiss in 1951.

•In 1961 Szilárd published a book of short stories, *The Voice* of the Dolphins

They spent last years Salk Institute in San Diego
In 1960, Szilárd was diagnosed with bladder cancer
In May 1964, Szilárd died in his sleep of a heart attack.
